

We are excited to welcome you to the United Kingdom (UK). As you begin your journey as a healthcare professional here, this document provides invaluable insights and resources to help you adjust to life in the UK.

Please note: The companies, attractions, locations, and information contained within this document are intended to be used as generic guidance and information only, which has been sourced on or around the date of publication of this guide (produced in March 2024).

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Arriving in the UK

International healthcare professionals moving to the UK will be sent an email a few days prior to travelling. This email will contain vital information regarding your arrival in the UK, such as the designated contact from NHS Professionals International who will meet you at the airport, relevant timings, and guidance on how to get ready for your journey.

Depending on the location of the Trust you will be working for, you will arrive in one of the following UK airports:

South of England – Heathrow or Gatwick

Heathrow airport

- This airport has four terminals: Terminal 2, 3, 4, and 5. Find out how to navigate the airport here **heathrow.com**
- The general meeting point will be by the WHSmith store which is located inside the arrival hall of your landing terminal. If this meeting point changes, you will be notified

Gatwick airport

- This airport has two terminals: North and South. Find out how to navigate the airport here gatwickairport.com
- meeting point will be shared with you closer to the date of your arrival

Midlands - Birmingham

Birmingham airport

- This airport has one arrival terminal. Find out how to navigate the airport here **birminghamairport.co.uk**
- The general meeting point will be by the Costa Coffee shop. If this meeting point changes, you will be notified

North of England – Manchester or Newcastle

Manchester airport

- This airport has three terminals. Find out how to navigate the airport here manchester-airport-guide.co.uk
- meeting point will be shared with you closer to the date of your arrival

Newcastle airport

- This airport has one terminal. Find out how to navigate the airport here newcastle-airport-guide.co.uk
- A meeting point will be shared with you closer to the date of your arrival

Important points to consider for your arrival date

- You will be added to a WhatsApp group, or sent the link to join the group yourself
- There may be occasions where you will be greeted at the airport by the transport driver instead of an NHS Professionals International Coordinator. We will notify you if this happens
- Please update us on your journey progress via WhatsApp, including when you have landed, cleared immigration, and claimed your luggage. This information allows the person meeting you know when to expect you at the meeting point
- When you arrive at the meeting point, the NHS Professionals
 International Coordinator may ask to take photos to celebrate your arrival. This will only be conducted with your consent, and you have the right to decline
- Our Coordinators are happy to answer any questions or queries before escorting you to the pre-booked transportation that will lead you to your accommodation

Getting settled in the UK

Registering with a Doctor

Once you have arrived and have settled in your new home, we recommend registering with your local Doctor (also known as a General Practitioner or GP). You can find your local GP surgery here nhs.uk/nhs-services

Registering with a Dentist

We recommend registering with an NHS Dentist as soon as possible, due to long waiting lists. You can check your eligibility and find your local Dentist here nhs.uk/nhs-services/dentists

Living in the UK

Discovering accommodation in the UK, managing bills, navigating supermarkets, and mastering other shopping essentials are key aspects of settling into life in the UK.

Example utility bills you will have to pay when living in the UK:

Council Tax

This is an annual fee you pay to your local council. To find out how much you will have to pay, visit here **gov.uk/pay-council-tax**

Water bill

You are required to pay for your water and sewage services each year. Please check your own local provider as this will vary, depending on where you live. You should automatically receive a letter when you move to your new property with all the relevant information to pay

Gas and electric bills

You are required to pay for your electricity and gas services each year. Please check your current supplier at the property. You should automatically receive a letter when you move to your new property with all the relevant information to pay

• TV license

You are required to pay for a TV license to watch, or record, live programmes on a TV, computer, or another device. You are also required to pay if you watch on-demand BBC programmes

Public Transport

Navigating public transport is an important part to getting around your new town efficiently and travelling to work. Below are examples of the different types of public transport you may find in the UK.

Buses

Most UK towns/cities offer regular bus services. There are various ways of paying for a bus ticket, for example buying directly from the driver on the bus with cash or card, buying online or by using an oyster card/bus pass. To find your local bus schedule, you can search the bus company online.

Large areas, like the West Midlands and Greater Manchester, have their own regional travelcards which are valid on all public transport within the area.

Oyster cards

Oyster cards are electronic smartcards for public transport in London. To use your card, tap it on yellow card readers, at the start and end of your journey (this may vary depending on the type of transport you are using). Oyster cards can be used on underground trains, overground trains, buses, and tram link.

Trains

Trains are a popular way of travelling around the UK. There are useful websites and applications such as Trainline to help compare train times and prices. You may be eligible to purchase a railcard which could save you money when travelling by train.

Trams

There are tram services in areas such as Edinburgh, Birmingham, Sheffield, Manchester, Newcastle, and Nottingham. You can purchase tram tickets either with an on-board Conductor, from a ticket machine or by tapping your bank card on a contactless area before and after your travel. Coach

Travelling by coach is a great alternative to a train or car, although journey times can be longer. If you have any travel plans to visit more of the UK, we recommend planning and booking your coach tickets in advance. Taxis

Taxis and minicabs are available in most cities and towns across the UK. Taxi ranks can usually be found just outside train stations or in the city centre. You can also phone local taxi companies to pick you up from a particular location. As well as this, companies like Uber or Bolt are also very popular services and can be found in many of the major towns and cities.

Navigation

An application that specialises in navigation is **moovitapp.com**. Offering various travel choices and directions tailored to your specific journey, this company assists users in finding the quickest and cheapest journey.

Selecting a school for your children

Depending on your school requirements, information may vary. Below are important things to note about schools in the UK:

State funded schools are free to attend and funded by the government

Example of school types, based on age:

- Primary schools (ages 4-11)
- Secondary schools (ages 11-16/18)

Things to consider when reviewing a school:

- Academic performance (test scores)
- Extracurricular activities offered (sports, clubs etc.)
- Special programmes (gifted education, vocational training)
- School size and environment (urban, rural, religious affiliation)
- Location and commute time

School schedule:

- Typical school hours are between 8:30am to 3:30pm, with breaks throughout the day

• Schools require students to wear uniforms. The school will provide further information on how to acquire uniforms

NHS discount

Blue Light Card

As an NHS employee, you can sign-up for a Blue Light card. With this
card, you can receive discounts on a variety of products and companies
include restaurants, travel, and retail shopping

Important points to note about Blue Light card:

- To sign-up, you must prove you work for the NHS. Examples of identification are a photo of your NHS ID card or a payslip (within the last 3 months) showing your name, job title and your Trust
- To apply for the card, you must pay a fee of £4.99 which last two-years
