It's crucial that you are fully informed about the legal obligations and the potential additional costs associated with driving in the UK, which may vary from your home country.

Driving in UK

- Driving in the UK requires compliance with certain legal requirements. These include having valid road tax, a Ministry of Transport test (MOT) (ensuring the vehicle meets road safety standards), and adequate insurance coverage, with the minimum being third-party insurance. These obligations will cost you various amounts and must be met annually. These are all compulsory for driving on UK roads.

Which overseas driving licenses allow you to drive in the UK?

EU countries:

- You are not required to convert to a UK driving license; you can drive using your current license
- Please verify your driving license to ensure it covers the category of vehicle you are driving in the UK
- Speak with your employer to confirm whether any restrictions apply to your current driving license for your new job



You can drive on a full valid driving license for 12 months from when you become UK resident from the following locations:

- Gibraltar
- Jersey
- Guernsey
- Isle of Man

As well as the following designated countries:

- Australia
- Barbados
- British Virgin Islands
- Canada
- Cayman Islands
- Falkland Islands
- Faroe Islands
- Gibraltar
- Hong Kong
- Japan
- Monaco
- New Zealand

- United Arab Emirates
- Zimbabwe

After 12 months, you will need to exchange your license. Please note, there may be a cost associated and this may vary depending on country and type of license you hold.

Other countries

 Once you have become a UK resident, you can your current driving licence for 12 months. After 12 months, you will need to <u>apply for a provisional</u> <u>licence</u> and pass the <u>theory</u> and <u>practical</u> driving tests

Learning to drive in the UK

- In the UK, the process of learning to drive involves gaining a provisional license and then enlisting the guidance of a driving instructor to acquire driving skills
- The cost of a provisional driving license cost varies from circa £34.00 to £43.00
- To obtain a license, you must pass a theory and practical driving test. Find out more here: Learn to drive a car: step by step GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)
